The Colorado Automobile Theft Prevention Authority (CATPA) welcomes you to its very first edition of the CATPA Catalyst Newsletter.

The CATPA grant program established a strong foundation with law enforcement and the insurance industry in 2003 and has been making tremendous strides each year to reduce auto theft in Colorado. Beginning in 2008 the program was awarded \$4 million per year, and we are extremely proud to announce a 40% reduction in auto theft in addition to a monetary savings of \$52 million to the citizens of Colorado. I thank and commend all of those task force members, teams and partner agencies for their collaborative efforts towards these outstanding results!

I want to express my personal appreciation for the commitment of the Colorado Auto Theft Prevention Authority (CATPA) Board. During each board meeting every member has asked questions, commented on ideas, and have been completely engaged in our mission of reducing auto thefts in Colorado. The board has reviewed every applications' grant and budget lines, and are accountable for the impact of decisions made that affect the citizens of the state of Colorado.

On February 15, 2011 CATPA had the tremendous opportunity to be a part of a news conference that was held at the State Capitol announcing the launch of a newly created public awareness campaign. The Coloradans Against Auto Theft (CAAT) "Lockdown" initiative was formed to educate the public of auto theft in Colorado and steps to prevent them from becoming a victim of this crime. Governor Hickenlooper proclaimed the week of February 13-19, 2011 as Auto Theft Prevention Week in Colorado. Many representatives of auto theft task forces, law enforcement, insurance partners, CATPA board members and stakeholders, and nonprofit corporations attended this news conference to show their support and were recognized for their efforts to reduce auto theft.

The media coverage included the announcement of the newly created "Lockdown" brand website, www.lockdownyourcar.org, the statewide distribution of auto theft prevention postcards/posters and demonstrations of automated license plate readers. CAAT is funded by a CATPA grant and is in partnership with other CATPA stakeholders.



We believe this campaign to be another useful tool in the fight against auto theft in Colorado, and look forward to further reductions in auto theft in Colorado.

Speaking from the perspective of someone who has been engaged in auto theft investigations for over 35 years the dramatic decline in motor vehicle thefts in Colorado since, and in significant part because of, CATPA programs is huge. The multi-agency task forces, the strategic focus on repeat and professional criminals and the public education efforts funded by CATPA have demonstrated in only a few years of operation that our funded programs not only work but have resulted in cutting this crime in half. No other program has had such significant and sustained success on the object of its mission! Not only have auto thefts been greatly cut but the collateral crimes of Identity Theft, drug trafficking and other street crimes are have been appreciably reduced due to their dependence on criminals needing stolen cars to facilitate these crimes. As I approach my one-year anniversary with the CATPA program, CATPA Board Members, CATPA Staff, and CATPA Grantees prepare for the Spring 2011 Grant Cycle. While there is much work that comes in preparing and participating in a Grant Cycle, it is always good to see the Grantees and I look forward to seeing what innovative ideas have been developed for this cycle!

As I have traveled around the State to meet with CATPA Grantees and their partners, it is evident the dedication that all partners and the CATPA Board have towards combating auto theft in Colorado. The partnerships that have been developed and continue to develop throughout the State are important to achieve the CATPA goal. Thank you for the invitations to attend your meetings and allowing me to participate in many ride-a-longs!

Each CATPA Grant Cycle, the CATPA Board approves and distributes approximately \$2 million in grants to support this mission. As our State is dealing with a large financial deficit, it is our responsibility to ensure these funds are spent accordingly.

With any distribution of funds, there is always paperwork – whether it is a report that demonstrates that goals

are being achieved or simply to seek reimbursement for project expenses; paperwork is a necessary evil! It not only provides documentation of the work that is being performed, but also provides detailed information on how the money is being spent.

So for the inaugural article, I've compiled three most commonly asked questions (and answers) regarding a Grantee's budget and submission of invoices.

1. Why is a shipping document or order form not acceptable to use as a receipt of purchase? ANSWER: The shipping document or order form is not proof that the product was received or paid for; it is only proof that an order was placed. The State of Colorado does not allow for pre-payment of goods or services except in distinct circumstances or when a waiver is requested and approved by the Colorado State Controller.

2. Why do you require that there is a detailed list of items purchased with a receipt? Sometimes a Company doesn't supply that detail with the receipt, what do I do then? ANSWER: There must be some documentation as to what items were purchased and CATPA Staff ensure that these items reconcile with the Budget documentation that was approved by the CATPA Board. If that information is not provided on the receipt, the Grantee can compile a list of what was purchased and submit with the receipt. This ensures that there is documentation regarding the purchase in the event there is an audit. It is the Grantee's responsibility to ensure that CATPA funds are being utilized as approved by the CATPA Board.

3. What if I identify that I have some funds that I would like to spend on something different than requested? ANSWER: The CATPA Board has granted approval for Budget changes to Lori and Diana up to 10% or \$10,000, whichever is less for line item changes. If the request is more than that, it does require CATPA Board approval. Contact Diana as soon as possible to ensure that your Budget Revision is placed on the next CATPA Board meeting agenda. Just ensure that no funds are spent on the newly identified item(s) until after CATPA Staff or CATPA Board approval.
